Overview


Cuyahoga Arts & Culture (CAC)'s mission is to **inspire and strengthen the community by investing in arts and culture.** CAC is funded by a ten-year tax levy approved by voters in 2006 and reapproved in 2015. Cuyahoga Arts & Culture is the largest funder of arts and cultural experiences in Cuyahoga County, Ohio.

Since 2006, CAC has made over **4,000 grants** totaling **\$247 million** to **485 nonprofits**. Every year CAC-funded nonprofits offer **millions of cultural experiences**. About **50% are free of charge**.

Facts

- **Structure:** CAC is an independent political subdivision of the State of Ohio; not a part of County or City government. By law, <u>CAC can only make grants to nonprofits</u>.
- **Tax Revenue:** Funded solely by a 1 ½ cent per cigarette tax: renewed in 2015, expires January 31, 2027. Annual tax revenue is 50% less than the first year of collection.
- Staff: CAC employs a staff of seven, led by Executive Director Jill Paulsen.
- Board: CAC is governed by a Board of five volunteers who are appointed by Cuyahoga County; they serve three-year terms without compensation. Karolyn Isenhart is CAC's Board President.

- **Service Area:** CAC funds programming in every ZIP code in the County. Each of the dots on the map (above) represents a unique location where a CAC-funded program has taken place.
